A BRIGHT SIGN!

This week, Ann and I were at the Holy Cross Abbey in Berryville, VA. It is a quiet sacred Trappist Monastery that includes a small retreat house. Over the years Ann and I have learned that our spiritual journey needs rejuvenation. It is a time to put the busyness of the world aside and to listen to God speaking to us through His Word. We also seek God's presence through the signs and wonders of nature that reside in the 800 acres boarding the Shenandoah River. Holy Cross Abbey is truly a holy place.

We were there to listen for the "still small voice" of God. We needed God's help to discern the next direction in Ann's treatment for Multiple Myeloma. While the critical numerical measurements of the Multiple Myeloma intensity are coming down, the Johns Hopkins doctor and us are trying to discern the next direction of infusion verses Ann's quality of life. We know that we will come to a time when additional infusions will be required, but right now additional infusions are optional. We are looking at being proactive instead of reactive to addressing the remaining few, but viable, Multiple Myeloma cells. As many of you know there are always side-effects to any medical treatment.

So we came to the Abbey seeking discernment in the serene quietness of mid-winter.

What we found was reassurance that God is with us, still, in this critical life journey.

The Wednesday storm was coming across the Shenandoah Mountains about 4:30PM – rain, bursts of thunder, lightning and much more rain. Slowly the storm moved through the valley on its march towards Washington and Baltimore.

And then the "assurance" occurred! A double rainbow that touched both sides of the valley was upon us. An amazing sight –not a partial rainbow, not a segment of a rainbow, but a double complete semi-circle rainbow – brilliant red, yellow, green and blue and bright sunlight. Ann and I were awe struck. We were sitting in a three sided glass enclosed porch sharing our thoughts and concerns about the chemo treatments, when the rainbow appeared. The porch gave us a panoramic view of the rainbow. The timing was unexplainable.

TRUSTEES REPORT

Members met on January 14, 2016 to hold the first meeting for this year. As is the case with each new year, nominations were held for someone to act as Chair of the committee for the 2016 calendar year. Margarete Arnold was re-elected for another year.

The Committee looked at pending projects and prioritized them in the order in which we felt they could be accomplished, and necessity. The following order was agreed on: Tracey Building—upgrade both bathrooms, painting walls and ceilings with mold proof paint, repairing or replacing stall walls, replacing spigots, possibly installing electric hand dryers and removing current sinks and replacing with cabinet units to provide storage. We will begin in the ladies room.

Secondly, the Social Hall—there is great need to repair the basement walls inside and out. Additionally, paint and caulk in existing bathroom and will look into the logistics of adding a second bathroom. There is also a need to looking into an option to handle the backflow water and basement drainage onto Pleasant Grove Road. Remove existing bathroom in basement and clean out the basement, as well as remove the hand sink in the kitchen.

Spring Workday is scheduled for **March 12th at 8:00am**, at which time, we will be cleaning up the cemetery for spring mowing and other outside sprucing up around the buildings. A rain date of March 19th was agreed on.

There are many other small projects that we will tackle throughout the year. Plastering and painting the ceiling and walls in the dining hall of the Social Hall will be put on hold, as it will be a major financial project.

The Trustees meet on the 2nd Thursday of each month. All meetings are open and all are welcome to attend.

FINANCE REPORT

Year 2015 has come and gone. Just as each of you is putting together their 2015 tax information for the government the church mush report year end statistics to the Baltimore Washington Conference; only Conference information was due January 20th. Conference reviews the figures from 2015 and applies a formula approved by General Conference to determine what each Church should contribute toward apportionments paid to Conference in a future year (2017).

Our yearly budget falls into two groupings. The first is for programs, office operating, salaries and compensations, and Conference apportionments. We expect all of these items to be paid from our weekly offerings. The second group is buildings and grounds maintenance and these are paid fro from our Perpetual Care funds which have been invested.

For 2015 we estimated the programs, operations and salaries at \$84,047 and actual expenditures were \$78,240. **Unfortunately, our weekly collections only came to \$67,066**; we had to draw money from our Discretionary fund to pay the 2015 Apportionments (\$11,174). We estimated building and maintenance at \$21,608 and actual expenditures were \$11,619. These expenditures are covered under our Perpetual Care Funds.

Our 2016 Budget has been submitted and approved by the Administrative Council and we have included a copy in this newsletter for your information. The Program/Office Operating Expenses/Salaries and Apportionments is estimated to by \$85,850. (Based on the figures submitted to Conference in 2014 we will pay apportionments of \$12,358 in 2016). The Buildings and Grounds protion of the 2016 year is estimated at \$20,833; our total estimated budget for 2016 is \$106.683.

Remember, if you are on vacation, or Church is cancelled because of inclement weather, we still need you to faithfully submit your tithes so we can pay our bills. Just like your home expenses, we have to pay fuel, phone and electric bills every month. We try to be diligent in our use of funds but we cannot exist without the support of each and every member.

SPRING BUS TRIP


The United Methodist Women will be headed New York City on May 10—May 11, 2016.
